Positions available and application timetables (all positions require a background check):

Environmental Education Fellow (1st year)

- 6 positions available for immediate hire full applications will be considered upon receipt.
- 9 positions available for the 2024-2025 school year
- Fall 2024- Full applications will be accepted on a rolling basis with priority consideration deadline of March 6th. All applications that have been submitted up until that date will be reviewed at that time, with interview opportunities following close behind. Applications will continue to be accepted and considered after that date until all positions are filled.

Environmental Education Fellow Mentor (2nd year)

- Up to 5 positions available, requires 1st year fellowship experience
- Apply for the one year fellowship. Feel free to express your interest in the 2 year position in your cover letter, and which focus area would suit you best if applicable.

Substitute Environmental Educator

Environmental Education Fellow (1st year)

Gain experience in current environmental education methods, as well as knowledge of Minnesota's unique biomes and natural history through training seminars, direct mentorship, graduate-level coursework, and on-the-job learning.

Position Dates:

Winter 2024 Cohort: Immediate - December. 2024 - negotiable Fall 2024 Cohort: August 14th, 2024 - August 8th, 2025

Responsibilities:

- Teach ecology, wildlife, adventure, and cultural classes to large and small groups of all ages, including evening and weekend programming.
- Plan and lead Summer Camp programming and free-time activities.
 - Overnight counseling may be required for overnight camps and college groups.
- Serve as the primary representative and host to visiting conference and retreat groups. This includes being on-call for overnight visitors and serving food
- Attend weekly staff meetings and regular training throughout the year
- Provide basic husbandry for our animal ambassadors, including raptors, corvids, mammals, invertebrates and herps. This includes meal preparation requiring the cutting up of frozen animals and the maintenance of feeder invertebrates and dermestid beetle colony.
- Complete other self-directed projects, or projects/tasks as assigned

Environmental Education Fellow Mentor (2nd year)

Our Leadership Program is committed to developing the talents of emerging leaders in environmental education through on-the-job experience, mentorship, on-site training seminars, and professional development at conferences and off-site training. Spend your first year learning the ins-and-outs of residential environmental education through hands-on experiences and through our extensive professional development program. During your second year, develop your leadership skills as a Mentor Educator for our team of instructors and receive tailored training in a self-selected focus area. There are 5 positions available.

Position Dates:

This fellowship begins after successful completion of the 1 year fellowship

Year 2 Responsibilities:

- Continue with Year 1 Responsibilities
- Maintain a growth mindset particularly in peer mentorship skills
- Complete Specific Focus area tasks as applicable:

Frontline Education Lead (up to 2):

- Serve as a resource for other fellows regarding the OWELC Curriculum
- Maintain programming materials and supplies inventory
- Assist in training fellows on OWELC lessons, teaching strategies, and classroom management
- Learn to develop, pilot, and assess inquiry-based curricula
- Work with the Ed Leadership team on specific projects based on your unique professional development goals and programmatic needs

- Interest or experience in working with learners of all ages; particularly elementary and middle school age
- Interest <u>and</u> experience in outdoor activities including, but not limited to: camping, canoeing, backpacking, climbing, hiking.
- Must be excited to learn and try new things, and willing to take initiative to support our programs and staff.
- Ability to lift heavy equipment, such as a canoe, hike long distances, and work outside in all weather conditions

- (During Summer) Assist with Summer Camp programming, free-time activities, and general supervision, whether virtual or onsite.
