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OUTDOOR SCHOOL FOR ALL

This spring, legislation was introduced at the MN Capitol that has the potential to be the most bipartisan bill passed in recent historical memory. Working together with legislators, Minnesota's residential environmental learning centers, including Osprey Wilds, have introduced Outdoor School For All Minnesota. This program would fund every 4th-8th grade K-12 student in Minnesota to attend a multi-day outdoor learning experience at an accredited outdoor school.



Even with our rich outdoor heritage and nation leading number of accredited residential environmental learning centers (outdoor schools), currently only 30% of Minnesota K-12 students participate in these overnight outdoor learning experiences. Outdoor School For All would create a grant program to fund every K-12 student that experience, regardless of their zip code, economic background, or school they attend. This year we have been able to partner with two AmeriCorps programs to help drive our mission even further. Kaden, our Communications Outreach Specialist, joined us through Conservation Corps, Minnesota & Iowa. Then in August, we were granted an AmeriCorps NCCC team to help with significant land management projects. Osprey Wilds and other non-profit organizations benefit tremendously from these strong volunteer-base programs.

BEOUESTS GROW ENDOWMENT FUND

Both last summer and this, Osprey Wilds was the grateful beneficiary of legacy gifts that together swelled the endowment by more than \$515,000—an almost 60% increase! Bequests left in a will are the most common type of legacy gift, though in the past five years, Osprey Wilds has also been the named beneficiary of a retirement account and received the proceeds from a charitable gift annuity. Bequests themselves can take different forms, with the most common being cash, stock shares, and real estate.
