Equity – We actively incorporate the lenses of equity and representation in our education, environmentalism, and leadership.

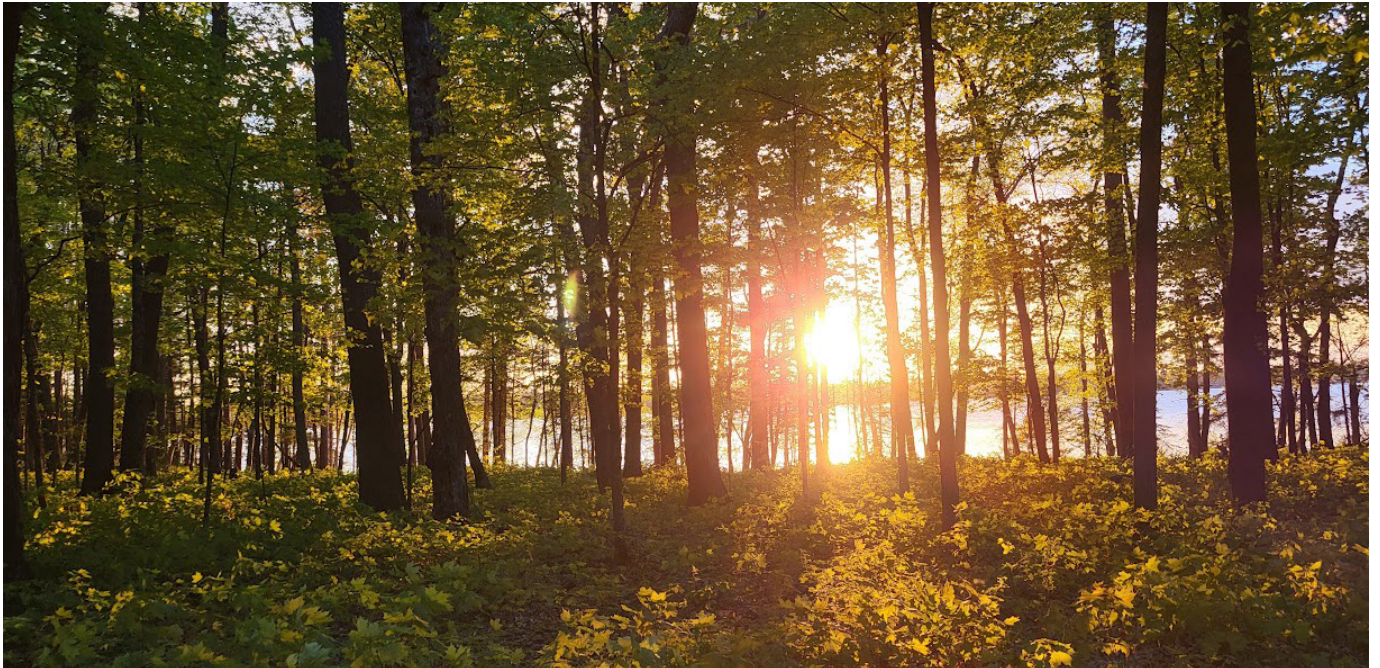

EQUITY STATEMENT

Osprey Wilds actively incorporates the lenses of equity and representation in our education, environmentalism and leadership. We do this by dismantling and re-designing processes and systems to be accessible to and welcoming of all people; creating programs and services in collaboration with diverse communities; and valuing those who work with and for us.



LAND ACKNOWLEDGMENT

Osprey Wilds acknowledges that our property sits upon the ancestral and traditional homelands of Indigenous people, most recently the Ojibwe, whose land was seized by the United States government by the Treaty of 1837 and colonized by European settlers. The Ojibwe continue to reside throughout East Central Minnesota and have a sovereign infrastructure of schools, roads, health care, services, housing, and more. From their ancestors to current day, the Ojibwe are committed to protecting and preserving natural resources. Osprey Wilds shares this commitment and works to ensure responsible care and attention through developing an understanding, ethics, and responsibility regarding the environment through formal and informal teaching that links nature and humans. While land acknowledgment does not deliver justice for the loss of the land and the damage done to people and cultures, Osprey Wilds will continue to deepen our knowledge and relationships, enriching practices that respect and honor the past, present, and future of the region's Indigenous communities.

PROGRAMS

For the 2023-24 school year the number of schools attending residential programming increased by 6 schools, 4 of which were new schools. Our student numbers increased by 10% growing from 2210 the previous year to 2461 this year. Parents are still hesitant about sending their students to overnight programming away from home which impacted the final numbers of students each school had when they arrived for their programming, but we were able to make up that difference with the additional schools that scheduled for this year.

To help increase our visibility with schools, we developed a new position and hired Stephanie Champ as our part-time K-12 Advancement Specialist. Stephanie reaches out to individual schools via email, phone calls and letters. She also attends job fairs to help with Education Fellow recruiting. From December to June, Stephanie made three unique contacts (email, phone call, and letter) to 355 individuals. Through Stephanie's efforts, we have five new schools and one lapsed school committed to coming for the 2024-25 school year.

We also saw a change in our wildlife program management over FY2024. Savannah Maiers stepped down as the Wildlife Coordinator in September of 2023. We were very lucky to have Regina Lobner who was our Wildlife Education Fellow step up as lead worker while we conducted a national search for a new Wildlife Coordinator. We saw many high quality applicants and are very pleased that we were able to hire Regina Lobner as our permanent Wildlife Coordinator. She transitioned into her new position in November of 2023.

We added two new summer camps to our roster, one overnight camp called Becoming an Outdoors Girl (BOG), and one day camp called Nature's Fireworks which happened during the 4th of July week. Unfortunately we were unable to meet the minimum for BOG, but our other camps all ran successfully. Our summer camps focus on outdoor activities that are themed each week around a nature concept. Participants get to swim, use our climbing gym, take hikes, make art, and eat our delicious food every day!

This year we also welcomed back our Road Scholars Intergenerational programming. We held two weeks of overnight adventure programming for the Road Scholars. This was very well received by the participants and staff alike.

CHARTER SCHOOL DIVISION

Osprey Wilds has been authorizing charter schools since 2003—over 20 years! During the 2023-24 school year, Osprey Wilds authorized 36 schools across Minnesota, serving more than 10,000 students from preschool to high school, in places like La Crescent, Grand Portage, and Red Lake. Charter school authorizing is a key part of Osprey Wilds' mission to connect people to the environment through hands-on learning. Every school authorized by Osprey Wilds must include environmental education and track its impact on students. This means thousands of kids across the state spend time outdoors, learning about the world and finding ways to protect and improve the environment.

Osprey Wilds is unique among environmental learning centers in Minnesota and the country because it authorizes charter schools. Authorizers decide who can start a new school; set academic, financial, and operational standards; and oversee the school's performance. They also decide if a school should stay open or close when its contract ends. A big part of Osprey Wilds' work is supporting schools in these areas. In 2023-24, OW established monthly Communities of Practice with school leaders, created tools to help monitor school performance, and provided training to support strong school governance.

In alignment with OW's core value of equity ("We actively incorporate the lenses of equity and representation in our education, environmentalism, and leadership"), Osprey Wilds adopted a DEI (diversity, equity, and inclusion) work plan. Through the course of that plan, OW developed definitions for diversity, equity, inclusion, antiracism, anti-bias, and justice. OW also adopted an Indigenous Learners Acknowledgment, which recognizes that Osprey Wilds authorizes schools across Minnesota on Dakota, Ojibwe, and Ho Chunk land and serves students from Indigenous communities across the world.

Charter school authorizing has changed a lot since 2003. Today, Osprey Wilds authorizes more schools than any other authorizer in Minnesota. These schools are diverse in location, students, and programs, but they all share Osprey Wilds' vision for a healthy planet where all people live in balance with the earth. We're excited to see what the next 20 years will bring!

OPERATIONS IMPROVEMENTS

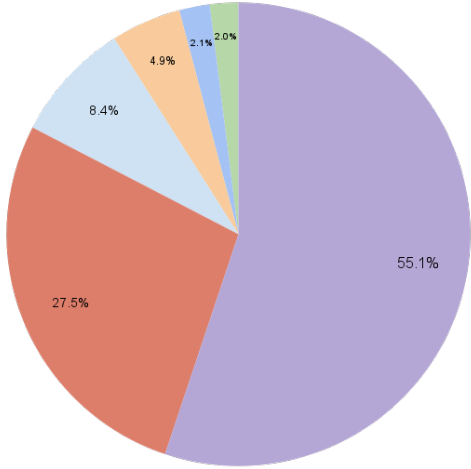

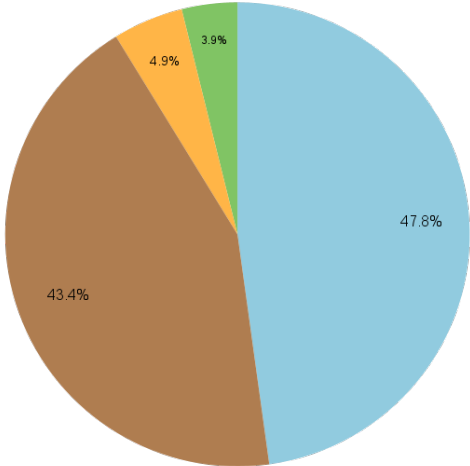

OUR DONORS

The 2023-24 fiscal year began strong, as we received In August the largest cash bequest ever made to Osprey Wilds, \$330,000 from the estate of Donald H. Nelson, a Rochester orthodontist, investor, and landowner who passed away in January 2023 at the age of 97. Nelson, who wasn't previously known to us, left similar amounts to Minnesota's four other accredited residential outdoor schools, plus millions more to a score of other area organizations and institutions that reflected his vision for environmental conservation, restoration, and education. Through his vision and generosity, Donald Nelson left a legacy that will benefit the lands and people of Minnesota and beyond for generations. Here at Osprey Wilds his gift has provided a major boost to our endowment fund, where it will grow to help meet future needs while providing annual income for operations and special projects.

Giving for annual support of operations was also noteworthy. The total budgeted for contributions for the year was \$301,000. By the end of the year more than 350 donors had contributed almost \$391,000, surpassing the goal by 30 percent. That generosity provided much-needed funding to support our programs and operations, care for our buildings and beautiful campus, make scholarships available, and fund a wide array of special projects.

Two events were highlights of the year. The annual Benefit Week in the fall provided donors with a variety of ways to engage with and support Osprey Wilds, including a series of online videos about our programs, the Bids for Kids online auction, and a gathering of more than 90 supporters at Urban Growler Brewery in St. Paul to conclude the week. The auction and contributions received throughout the week brought in more than \$30,000, targeted especially toward scholarships and program support for Osprey Wilds' K-12 outdoor learning program.

This July, shortly after the close of the fiscal year, we were thrilled to welcome more than 50 supporters to our 3rd annual Donor Appreciation Day and together celebrate the year's successes with a day of recreation, information, and good food. We relish these kinds of opportunities that allow us to thank our donors and strengthen our partnership.

Thank you for joining with us to help thousands of children, young people, and adults of all ages make meaningful connections with the natural world and grow in their commitment to its care. We couldn't do it without you!

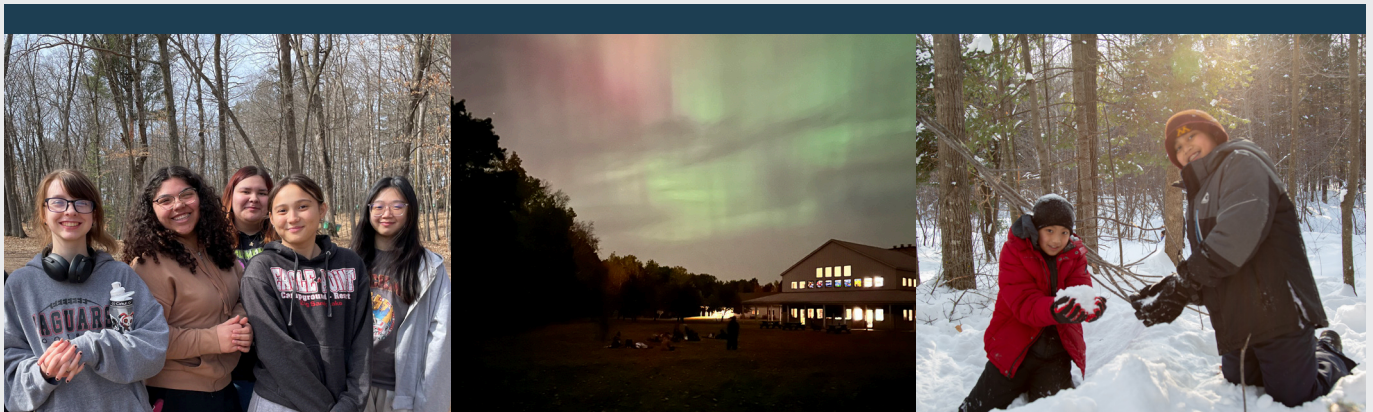

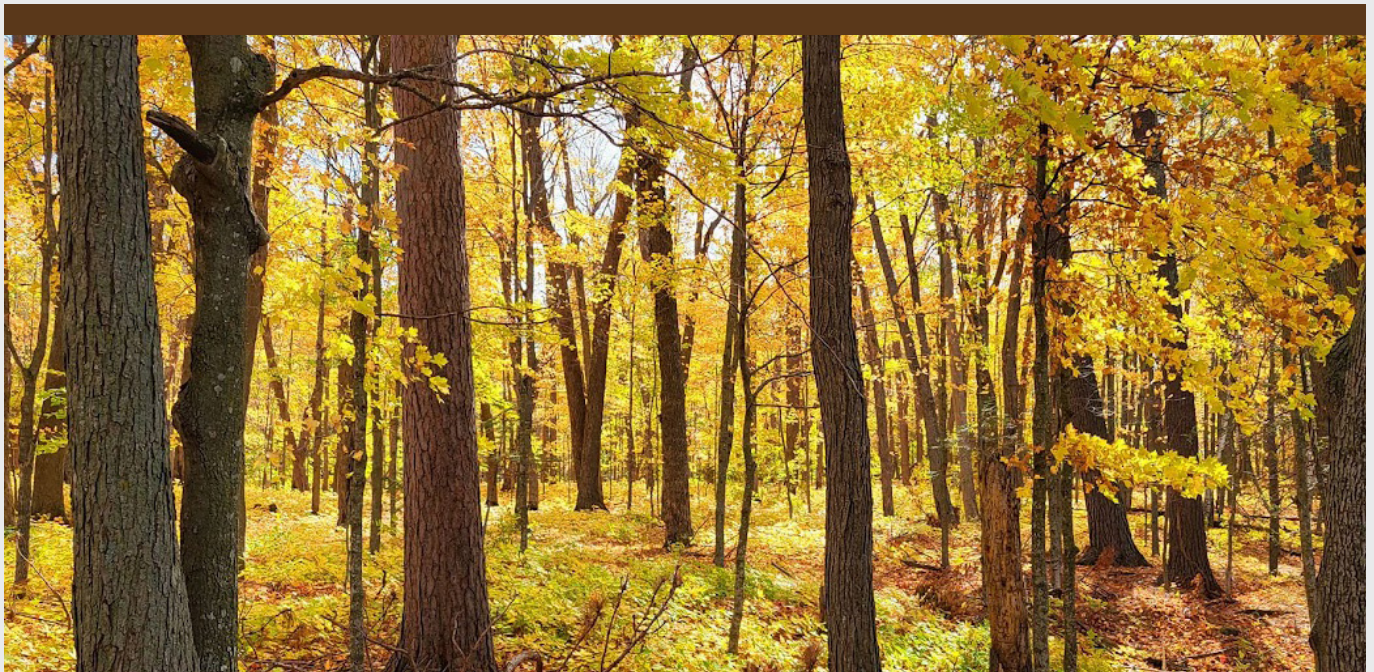
